Their dreaming is deep in the soil, rivers, oceans and wind holding the histories, lores, language and knowledge of this Country.


I extend my respect to other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people here today and highlight their continued, unbroken connection to Countries.

National Reconciliation Week

National Reconciliation Week is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia. The Week runs from **27 May to 3 June** every year. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey – the successful 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision. Reconciliation Australia's theme for 2022, "Be Brave. Make Change." is a challenge to all Australians— individuals, families, communities, organisations and government—to Be Brave and tackle the unfinished business of reconciliation so we can Make Change for the benefit of all Australians.

Siblings of current SSPS students will be accepted into Sans Souci Public School even if you reside outside of the school's enrolment catchment area.

School Uniform Standards

Sans Souci PS has a fine reputation within the community for the high standard of school uniform. The vast majority of students come to school on a daily basis proudly wearing full school uniform. It is vital that parents and carers support the school's efforts to maintain this standard by ensuring that all students are wearing the approved winter or sport uniforms on any given day. At this time of year full winter uniform is to be worn, including black school shoes. On specified days involving sport or PE activities students are permitted to wear sports shoes instead of black school shoes. Students are required to wear a school hat for all outside activities, including lunch and fruit break. Non-school coloured hats, jackets and other garments are not permitted. Parents are reminded that clean/washed second hand uniform spares are available from the canteen for \$2 per item. I trust all families will do their best to ensure the high standard of school uniform continues at Sans Souci! If you have any questions about school uniforms, please don't hesitate in contacting me.

Respectful interactions within the school community

Sans Souci Public School encourages respectful relationships in all interactions that take place within the school community. We welcome visitors to our school and endeavour to ensure that the school remains a safe place for pupils, staff, volunteers and members of our community. If parents or carers have concerns we will always seek to listen to and address them. However disrespectful, abusive or threatening behaviour will not be tolerated. It is never appropriate for parents to approach students from other families at school to try and resolve issues of concern. Please contact the school office to make an appointment if you have any concerns you would like to discuss.

PSSA Wet Weather Update

It was fantastic that PSSA sport finally recommenced today after 3 consecutive weeks of wet weather cancellations. Please understand that the decision to cancel PSSA is made by the Botany Bay PSSA executive, informed by the local council that decides if fields are unplayable in periods of wet weather. It is expected that there will be a few cancellations each season but if we have further cancellations, the school will consider a partial rebate of the fees in the form of fees in advance for other school activities.



Appointments During School Time

I remind parents and carers that wherever possible, medical appointments should be made outside of school hours as it is detrimental to students missing out on learning time. In extraordinary circumstances where a child needs to be picked up prior to 3:15pm, families should notify the school via email no later than 10am to allow time for the arrangement to be communicated to the appropriate staff member.

2R have been enjoying having Gymnastics for Sport. They are learning skills such as balancing, rolling, coordination and jumping.





Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- · Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.


